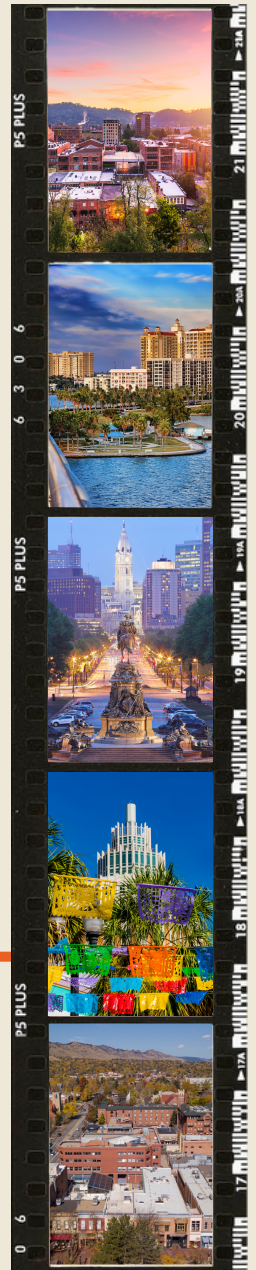

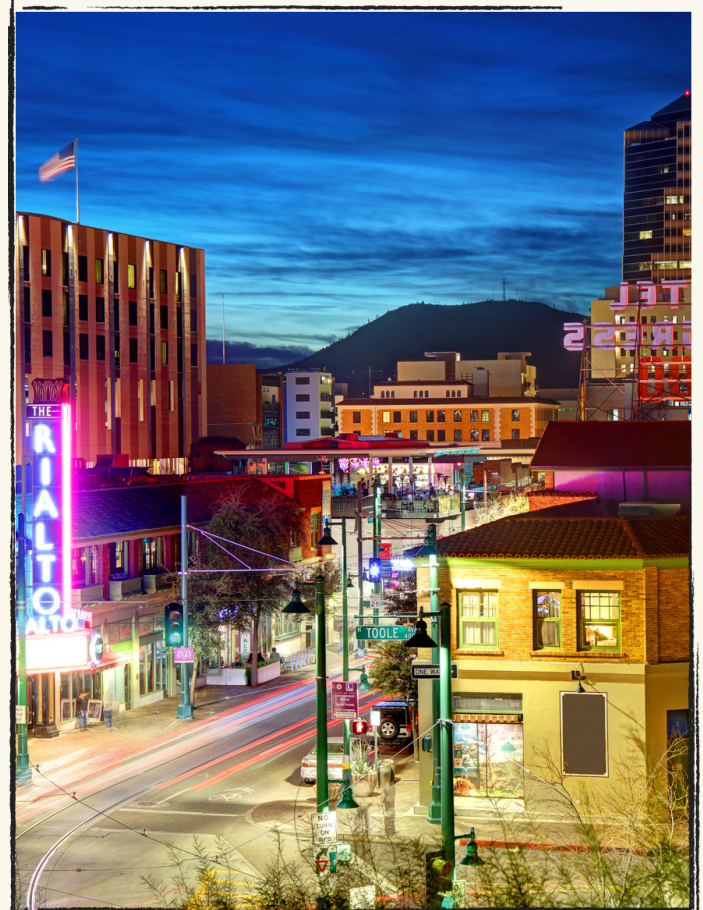


Ann Arbor, Michigan

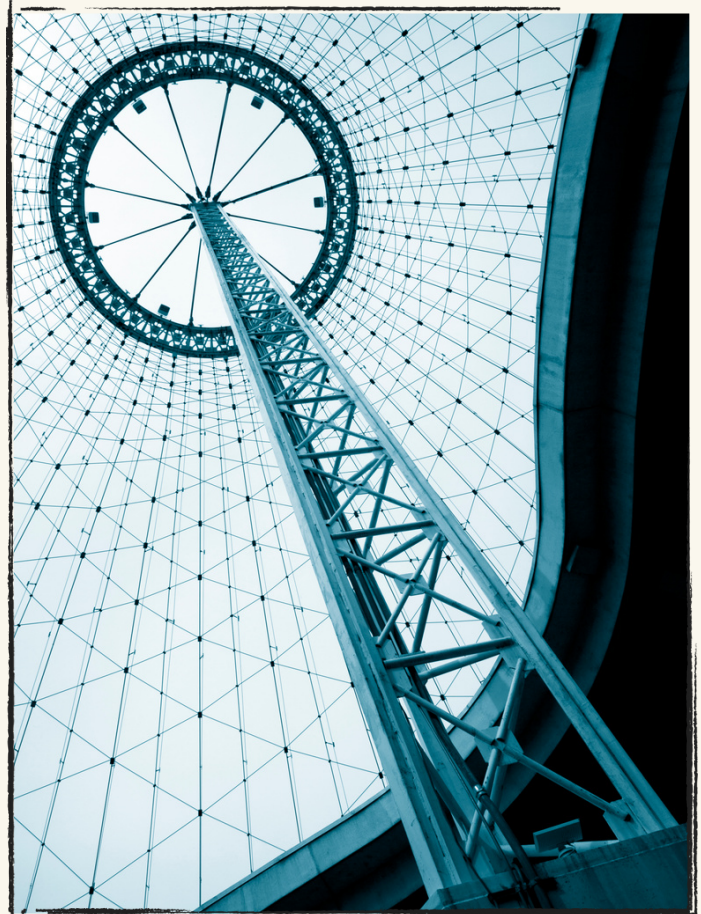


Grand Rapids, Michigan
